History: Originally developed in 1953 by the Greater Loretto Improvement Association, Burnett Park has been an asset to Mandarin residents for 50 years. Thanks in large part to the efforts of Mr. Joe Burnett and Mr. Jeff Davis, Burnett Park has evolved to meet the needs of the community over the last half century. Today, Burnett Park continues to be a community asset boasting several lighted baseball, softball, tennis, and basketball courts in addition to a community center, concession stand, bleachers, playscape, and ample parking. The acquisition of the 4.61 acreage in 1994 led to the construction of two new baseball diamonds and restroom facilities.

History: Goodbys Creek is a tributary of the St. Johns River, roughly dividing the Jacksonville communities of San Jose and Mandarin. When surveyed in 1792 for Francis Goodwin, the stream was known as Azza Creek, later to be known as Goodmans Lake, Goodbys Lake, and Goodbys Creek. During the latter twentieth century, tremendous residential and commercial development occurred around the creek, prompting the City and its non-profit partner, The Trust For Public Land, to seek preservation of the site. In January 2002, the Trust acquired 39 acres along the southernmost point of Goodbys Creek, and later that month deeded it to the City, which purchased the property with Preservation Project funds

History: Huntington Forest Park is located in the Mandarin area of southeast Jacksonville, east of Old St. Augustine Road. In 1819, after America obtained control of Florida from Spain, the area's name was changed to Mandarin, after the popular Chinese orange being grown in the area. With the opening of the St. Johns River Bridge (Acosta Bridge) in 1921, Mandarin began to grow slowly, but after the Buckman Bridge opened in 1970 and Interstates 95 and 295 became linked, residential growth exploded. The Riverside Group, the developer of the Huntington Forest subdivision, donated the land for the park to the City in 1986. With a lake bisecting the property and trees throughout the grounds, the site presents a nice setting for a neighborhood park.

History: Originally known as Southeast Regional Park North, Losco Regional Park is located on Hood Road South, north of Losco Road near Julington Creek. Conveniently located at the crossroads of Jacksonville`s bustling beltway system, Losco Regional Park lies west of Interstate 95 on the north side of Interstate 295. The City of Jacksonville acquired the land for the 210-acre park in the early part of 1998 when it purchased four adjacent parcels with a Florida Communities Trust grant for \$3.8 million. The existing amenities were completed in 2004, future phases include a nature center and trails.

History: This park is comprised of 2 lots purchased by the city. The first lot, which is 3.1 acres, was purchased on November 6, 2002 for a passive park. The access to this parcel is at the end of Chrysler Dr. The other parcel, which is 2.2 acres, was transferred to the park department on April 2, 2003 from JEA. This lot can only be developed for passive use with minimum construction of facilities. Access to this property is a driveway between two homes on Pickwick Dr. S.
